Chapter 2

Lesson 1 Make a Decision

Theme: Decision Making

Lesson Objective:

Students will demonstrate knowledge of the characteristics of decisions. Students will demonstrate ability to summarize important points from class discussion. (See matrix for Arizona Academic/Adult Standards).

Steps to Follow:

"When you come to a fork in the road, take it." -- Yogi Berra

- 1. State: there are many "formulas", "flowcharts", "models" to make decisions. But people make decisions in different ways. We're going to take three steps to make a decision: Step 1- Self-talk; Step 2- Gather Information; Step 3- Decide with Pride. Have students predict contents of each step. Show the 3 Steps to Decide with Pride (T1)
- 2. Define decision (an idea to include: decisions are inevitable; it's a decision to not make a decision).
- 3. Define decision (a problem to solve, action to take, goal to achieve, choice to make).
- 4. On the board as a group, partnered, or individually complete, *DECISIONS: The Web* S1. **See Lesson 1 Background for recommended ideas.**
- 5. Go around the web; give examples of each characteristic of decisions. Point out characteristics that make deciding difficult. If it hasn't come up already, discuss, how to know if it's the "right thing" or the "right" decision?
 - Emphasize a decision is "right" for you if, it <u>supports your values</u>, <u>leads to</u> (<u>not away from</u>) <u>your goals</u> and you are <u>comfortable</u> or you like living the consequences. "Comfortable" may mean that you are able to be proud as you explain to others what you decided and why. You don't have to blame others or make excuses. You live within the law. Discussion should also include your <u>"level of comfort" regarding others (victims</u>) having to live the consequences of your decisions.
- 6. Hand out *DECISIONS: Three Paragraphs S2* worksheet. Read directions aloud.

7. Before students start to write, show and explain the *M2W* Rubric (see Chapter 2 Background) by which their work will be measured.


3 Steps to

Step 3 Decide With Pride


Ask Yourself:
