

This past school year the ECE team finalized the School Readiness Framework. This is the culmination of two years of statewide work from numerous professionals committed to driving a shared understanding of the comprehensiveness of school readiness. This is an opportunity for ECQUIP teams, preschool and Kindergarten partners and, of course, leadership.

I would like to make note of our continued relationship with Teaching Strategies as the publisher of the Teaching Strategies Gold assessment. This summer, the ECE staff will be reviewing and revising professional development modules to intentionally link effective instruction and environments to assessment. ADE is also working with partners to create ECE guidance documents and tools to assist with implementation of a variety of assessments for preschool through kindergarten. The ECE team is looking for K-3 programs that are interested in piloting formative assessment in elementary classrooms. In Early 2015, the Early Childhood Unit proudly presented Arizona's School Readiness Framework (ASRF) to the public. Over 2 years and countless collaborations later, Arizona has adopted a comprehensive approach to describing what readiness looks like for young children entering kindergarten. In seeking a common definition of school readiness, the description of school readiness used in the ASRF emphasizes both the knowledge and attributes children need in order to attend to rigorous curriculum presented in the classroom. 

Those interested may apply to participate in an innovative project during the 2015 - 2016 school year designed to increase early childhood/K-3 school district teams' capacity to work effectively with children with Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASDs) during the critical years of brain and behavior development.

Applications will be reviewed by an ADE internal committee. Criteria to be considered are: submission date, geographical location, number of students with ASD, number of students with ASD being served, and demonstrated needs. Districts are encouraged to apply even if they were previously part of the project as an Early Childhood Team.

The STAR Program is a comprehensive behavioral program that incorporates the applied behavior analysis strategies of: Discrete Trial Training, Pivotal Response Training and Teaching Functional Routines. STAR also promotes the use of positive behavior interventions, environmental supports (visual supports, visual schedules, etc.) in inclusive and self-contained settings.

- ⇒ Participants will consist of up to 10 members from Local Education Agency teams
- ⇒ We are excited to continue to expand this opportunity in learning communities. Last year, we held cohorts with grades Pre-K to Grade 3; this year we are moving up to middle school and high school!

Did you know: Open-Ended Questions Encourage Creative and Critical Thinking!

A 30 million word gap exists between 3 year olds of low income families and those 3 year olds of high income households. Studies show that the amount of words children are exposed to well before kindergarten is directly related to this gap. Provided by the Los Angeles Universal Preschool (LAUP), as part of their partnership with Clinton Global Initiative Commitment to Action, "Take Time. Talk!" is an instrument to assist parents and those caring for children take part in giving children the words they need. Positive, open-ended conversations bolster vocabulary skills of some of our youngest learners, those ages 0-5.

The tool is **FREE** and is available in both English and Spanish.

Unmet Need for High Quality Early Education

High-quality early education lays the successful foundation on the path to becoming school ready. Regrettably, not all children in the U.S. have equal access to the high-quality early learning. In fact, 60 percent of four-year-olds are not enrolled in preschool programs that are funded publicly.

The school readiness gap that exists between children from low income and high income families can only be closed though new investments in high-quality early education. 
