Dear Superintendent Housley:

The Arizona Department of Education Audit Unit has conducted an audit of the Show Low Unified School District (District) Average Daily Membership (ADM) for Fiscal Years 2015, 2016 and 2017. The purpose of the audit was to address whether the District properly reported student enrollment, and to determine if it received the correct amount of Basic State Aid.

Auditors determined that the District incorrectly reported some enrollment data, which resulted in its ADM being overstated by 55.58. Additionally, auditors determined that the District incorrectly reported AOI enrollment data, which resulted in its ADM being overstated by 0.40. These errors resulted in an overstatement of 55.98 ADM and a net overpayment of \$261,146.35 in Basic State Aid, which must be repaid to ADE by the District pursuant to state law. Furthermore, auditors determined that the District failed to properly maintain some required documentation.

We appreciate the cooperation and assistance provided by the District's administration during the course of the audit.

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INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

The Arizona Department of Education (ADE) Audit Unit has conducted an Average Daily Membership (ADM) audit of the Show Low Unified School District (District) pursuant to Arizona Revised Statutes (A.R.S.) § 15-239. This audit focused on whether the District properly reported enrollment and attendance data to ADE and received the correct amount of Basic State Aid for fiscal years 2015, 2016 and 2017.

Average Daily Membership audits of district and charter holder funding—Pursuant to A.R.S. § 15-239, ADE may conduct ADM audits, which help ensure the appropriate distribution of Basic State Aid provided annually to school districts and charter schools. School districts and charter schools receive Basic State Aid based on several factors related to student enrollment and attendance. To receive funding, school districts and charter schools report enrollment and attendance data to ADE. ADE processes that data, determines payment amounts according to the relevant statutory funding formulas and distributes payments to schools up to twelve times each year.

The ADM audit process determines whether payments were correct or if an adjustment is needed. The audit process compares the school district's or charter school's information reported to ADE's student data system to information found on the original records kept at the school. If auditors find that the school district's or charter school's reported information does not match the original documentation, the audit will calculate and report the funding adjustment needed to the school district's or charter school's Basic State Aid. These funding adjustments can be positive or negative, depending upon the audit findings. The audit findings are written and compiled into a report that is then issued to the audited entity.

Superintendent's legal notice links the audit and appeals processes—In addition to the report, the audited entity receives The Notice of Audit Findings and Required Reimbursement (Notice) that details the audit findings and determination of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (Superintendent) regarding adjustments to be made to the school district or charter school pursuant to A.R.S. § 15-915. The audited entity may appeal the Superintendent's decision in the Notice.

Opportunity to appeal the audit—A.R.S. § 41-1092.03 provides the audited school district or charter school that disagrees with the Superintendent's decision in the Notice with the opportunity to file a formal appeal within thirty (30) days after the report was issued. If an appeal is filed, the school district or charter school and ADE may reach agreement in an informal settlement conference. If an agreement is not reached at the informal settlement conference, the appeal will be adjudicated by the Office of Administrative Hearings.

Funding adjustment process and timeframes—When the Notice is finally settled or adjudicated, if ADE has determined that a school district or charter school received an incorrect amount of Basic State Aid, A.R.S. § 15-915 directs that corrections to schools' funding be made in the current budget year. In case of hardship, schools may request that the Superintendent allow a correction to be made partly in the current budget year.

In addition, ADE will adjust the District's budget capacity if required. ADE School Finance Memorandum 13-011 summarizes the budget capacity adjustment authorized by statute:

A.R.S. §15-915, as amended by Laws 2014, Chapter 357, Section 3, requires the superintendent of public instruction, when it is determined that state aid or budget limits have been calculated in error, within the prior 3 years, to make corrections to budget limits and state aid in the current year. (Hardship application may be approved by the superintendent). Effective for audits initiated during FY2015 and continuing in subsequent years, corrections for audit findings to both budget capacity and state aid (when applicable) will be made.

District information—The District, located in Show Low, Arizona, had three elementary schools, one junior high school, one high school and an AOI during the fiscal years audited. Table 1 presents the District's unaudited student, staffing and financial information for FY2015, FY2016 and FY2017.

SCOPE AND METHODOLOGY

The audit focused on whether the District accurately reported its data to ADE and received the correct amount of Basic State Aid in accordance with statutes, the Uniform System of Financial Records (USFR) and its own policies and procedures for FY2015, FY2016 and FY2017.

To conduct this audit, auditors used a variety of methods, including examining District and ADE records to review 1,005 of 7,433 students over the three fiscal years audited. Adjustments to ADM are based solely on those identified students that the auditors evaluated further and are not extrapolated to create findings for the entire student population. Auditors also reviewed state statutes and District policies and procedures and interviewed District management and staff. Specifically:

- *Enrollment data* Auditors reviewed student schedules, enrollment dates, and attendance data to determine if the enrollment data reported to ADE was correct. Auditors compared the entry and exit dates to determine if an adjustment was necessary. Auditors also reviewed absences to ensure that they were reported correctly and made adjustments if they were needed.
- Arizona online instruction (AOI) data—Auditors compared 100% of the Arizona Online Instruction data that was reported to ADE to the AOI data from the District for 173 students. Auditors reviewed instructional time reported as well as the full or part time status that was reported for each student. When the data reported to ADE was incorrect, an adjustment was determined.
- **Student Files** Auditors reviewed student files to ensure that they maintained required residency documentation. Auditors identified files that did not contain all the residency documentation that was required to be kept in them by statute and ADE guidelines.
- *FTE calculations* Auditors reviewed the bell schedules and student schedules to determine whether the District reported the correct full-time enrollment (FTE) data to ADE. Auditors calculated the FTE based on the classes and time a student was enrolled in the District and compared the FTE to what was reported to ADE. When the FTE was incorrect, auditors made an adjustment.
- *Instructional hours* Auditors reviewed the bell schedules and calendars for the District for FY2015, FY2016 and FY2017. The total instructional hours offered for each grade met the minimum required by statute for each of the three fiscal years audited. No findings were identified for this area.
- **SPED Data** Auditors determined whether an adjusted student had also been funded for a special education (SPED) category. When a student with a SPED category also had an adjustment, auditors also made an adjustment to the SPED weight.

• *Limiting*—Auditors reviewed the total ADM for each enrolled student to ensure that they were appropriately limited by ADE's system. No findings were identified for this area.

The Audit Unit expresses its appreciation to the District's administration and staff members for their cooperation and assistance during the course of the audit.

FINDING 1: THE DISTRICT DID NOT ACCURATELY REPORT SOME STUDENT DATA, RESULTING IN AN OVERPAYMENT OF \$260,347.66

Auditors determined that the District inaccurately reported the student data for 89 students for FY2015, FY2016 and FY2017. Specifically, auditors found that 82 students had an incorrectly reported FTE, 1 student had an incorrect enrollment date, 1 student had not attended the District, and lastly 5 students were incorrectly reported as Homebound. Additionally, 21 of these students were also reported and funded for a special education category. As a result, the District's weighted special education ADM was over reported by 32.40. In total, the District's ADM was over reported by 55.58. As a result, the District was overfunded by \$260,347.66 in Basic State Aid. According to A.R.S. § 15-915, ADE needs to recover these monies from the District.

The District inaccurately reported some student enrollment data

The District inaccurately reported 89 students' enrollment data to ADE, which resulted in the District's ADM being overstated by 55.58.

According to A.R.S. § 15-901, for a high school student to be reported as a 1.0 FTE, the student must be enrolled in at least four courses which meet at least 123 hours annually each and total at least 720 instructional hours for the year. A student who does not meet these requirements is considered a part-time student and their FTE status must be reduced based on the number of actual instructional hours provided and courses enrolled.¹ In addition, according to ADE External Guideline and Procedures GE-17 and EX-1, with the exception of pre-enrolled students, the enrollment dates for a student are the first day of actual attendance and the last day of actual attendance or excused absence. Finally, A.R.S. § 15-901 specifies the requirements for a student to be reported as Homebound.

However, the District did not always adhere to these requirements. Specifically, for the students that were sampled:

- 82 students had an incorrect FTE reported. As a result, the ADM for the District was overreported by 19.05.
- 1 student had an incorrect enrollment date reported. As a result, the ADM for the District was underreported by 0.91.

¹ Pursuant to A.R.S. § 15-901, a full time student (1.0 FTE) in grades 9 through 12 must be scheduled for and attending at least 720 hours of instruction and at least four courses each of which meets for at least 123 hours annually; a 0.75 FTE student must be scheduled for at least 540 hours of instruction and at least three courses each of which meets for at least 123 hours annually, a 0.50 FTE student must be scheduled for at least 360 hours of instruction and at least two courses each of which meets for at least 123 hours annually and a 0.25 FTE student must be scheduled for at least 180 hours of instruction and at least one course which meets for at least 123 hours annually.

- 1 student was reported as having attended but did not actually attend the District. As a result, the ADM for the District was overreported by 1.00.
- 5 students did not meet the requirements for Homebound. As a result, the ADM for the District was overreported by 4.04.
- 21 students that were identified with an adjustment also had a SPED weight, which resulted in the weighted SPED ADM for the District to be overstated 32.40.

As shown in Table 2, enrollment data errors resulted in an ADM overstatement of 55.58 for the three fiscal years audited.

The District must properly reconcile its enrollment data with ADE

The District can likely avoid errors in the future by ensuring it regularly and correctly reconciles its data to the data contained in ADE's system. The District must ensure that a process is in place that captures the proper FTE, entry and exit dates and attendance of students to ensure proper funding and reporting of data. The District should review its reconciliation practices to ensure that its staff properly review the reports produced by ADE and reconcile them to the District's SMS data to identify any discrepancies and correct any errors identified. The District should review its internal reporting practices and ensure that it appropriately reports students as homebound and collects and maintains documents for homebound students pursuant to statute.

The District was overfunded by \$260,347.66

Auditors determined that the District did not receive the correct amount of Basic State Aid due to the inaccurate student data reported to ADE for fiscal years 2015, 2016 and 2017. The student data incorrectly reported by the District resulted in its ADM being overstated by 55.58. Due to the funding formula transition from using prior year data to current year data, FY2016 ADM did not

have Basic State Aid adjustments other than the impact to District Additional Assistance (DAA) for the following year. As a result, Basic State Aid was overfunded for the three years audited by \$168,235.70. However, statutory growth formulas applied to the District require that this amount be increased by \$92,111.96. As a net result, the District was overfunded by \$260,347.66 in Basic State Aid, which ADE must recoup from the District. Table 3 shows the ADM and funding adjustments required for the District for FY2015, FY2016 and FY2017.

Recommendations:

- 1. ADE must recoup from the District \$260,347.66 in Basic State Aid due to incorrectly reported student data.
- 2. The District must properly reconcile its data each year to ensure it complies with A.R.S. § 15-901.
- 3. The District needs to ensure that it properly calculates and reports students' FTE and enrollments pursuant to statute and ADE guidelines.

FINDING 2: THE DISTRICT DID NOT ACCURATELY REPORT AOI DATA, RESULTING IN AN OVERPAYMENT OF \$798.69

The District did not accurately report enrollment data for 97 of its AOI students to ADE for all three fiscal years audited. Specifically, auditors found that one student was reported as part time but should have been reported as full time, 80 students were reported as full time but should have been reported as part time, seven students did not attend, two students attended but were not reported to the ADE system and seven students were reported to ADE with incorrect minutes. As a result, the District's weighted AOI ADM was overstated by 0.40. This led to the District being overfunded by \$798.69 in Basic State Aid for the fiscal years audited, which the District must repay to ADE according to A.R.S. § 15-915.

The District inaccurately reported some AOI enrollment data

Auditors determined that student data for 97 of its AOI students was inaccurate, which resulted in the District's weighted AOI ADM being overstated by 0.40 for the fiscal years audited, as follows:

- 1 student was incorrectly reported as part time and should have been reported as full time.
- 80 students were incorrectly reported as full time and should have been reported as part time.
- 7 students were reported to the ADE system; however, no time was provided to show the students actually attended.
- 2 students were not reported to the ADE system; however, time was provided to show the students actually attended.
- 7 students were reported to the ADE system with incorrect AOI minutes.

As shown in Table 4, AOI data reporting errors resulted in a net weighted ADM overstatement of 0.40 for the three fiscal years audited.

The District must properly reconcile its AOI enrollment data with ADE's system

The District can likely avoid errors in the future by ensuring it regularly and correctly reconciles its data to the data contained in ADE's system. The District should review its reconciliation practices to ensure that its staff properly review the reports produced by ADE's system and reconcile them to the District's AOI SMS data to identify any discrepancies that would affect funding and correct any errors identified. The District must comply with the requirements of A.R.S. § 15-808 and SF-0003 when calculating and reporting AOI students.

The District was overfunded by \$798.69

Auditors determined that the District did not receive the correct amount of Basic State Aid due to the inaccurate AOI student data reported to ADE for the three fiscal years audited. The enrollment data errors reported by the District resulted in its ADM being overstated by 0.40. Due to the funding formula transition from using prior year data to current year data, FY2016 ADM did not have Basic State Aid adjustments other than the impact to District Additional Assistance (DAA) for the following year. As a result, Basic State Aid was underfunded for the three years audited by \$118.47. However, statutory growth formulas applied to the District require that this amount be increased by \$917.16. As shown in Table 5, due to the overstatement of 0.40 ADM for its AOI enrollment data, the District received an overpayment of \$798.69 in Basic State Aid for the three fiscal years audited, which the District must repay to ADE pursuant to A.R.S. § 15-915.

- 1. The District must repay ADE \$798.69 in Basic State Aid for the fiscal years audited for incorrect AOI enrollment data.
- 2. The District must comply with the requirements of A.R.S. § 15-808 and SF-0003 when calculating and reporting AOI students.

FINDING 3: THE DISTRICT DID NOT PROPERLY MAINTAIN SOME STUDENT RECORDS AS REQUIRED BY STATUTE AND GUIDELINE

Auditors determined that the District failed to properly maintain residency documentation for some students as required by statute and ADE guidelines. The District did not properly maintain required documentation in some of its student cumulative files. In the future, the District should properly maintain these documents to ensure compliance with statute and ADE guidelines.

The District did not properly maintain residency documentation

Auditors determined that the District failed to maintain residency documentation for some students as required by statute and ADE guidelines. According to A.R.S. § 15-802 and the ADE Arizona Residency Guideline, school districts and charter schools are required to maintain verifiable documentation of Arizona residency in the student's cumulative file. This documentation must be provided each time a student enrolls in a school district or charter school and reaffirmed during the annual registration process. The ADE Arizona Residency Guideline identifies an approved list of options a parent or legal guardian may provide to the school district or charter school to meet these requirements.

The District did not maintain the proper documentation required by statute and ADE's residency guideline. Of the 30 students sampled, 25 of the student files did not have the proper residency documentation obtained at the time of enrollment as the ADE Arizona Residency Guideline requires. Table 6 lists the Residency documentation maintained by the District for FY2015, FY2016 and FY2017.

In the future, the District must ensure that it complies with statute by collecting and maintaining in each student's cumulative file copies of verifiable residency documentation as required by law.

Recommendations:

- 1. The District must comply with statute and collect and maintain in each student's cumulative file copies of verifiable residency documentation as required by law.
- 2. The District needs to ensure it maintains all required documentation for students that attend the District.

ADM and Funding Adjustments

A.R.S. § 15-915 requires that ADE makes corrections for audit findings to both budget capacity and state aid. ADE's School Finance Unit's Memo 13-011 informs LEAs of these statutory requirements:

A.R.S. §15-915, as amended by Laws 2014, Chapter 357, Section 3, requires the superintendent of public instruction, when it is determined that state aid or budget limits have been calculated in error, within the prior 3 years, to make corrections to budget limits and state aid in the current year. (Hardship application may be approved by the superintendent). Effective for audits initiated during FY2015 and continuing in subsequent years, corrections for audit findings to both budget capacity and state aid (when applicable) will be made.

Budget capacity adjustment required—The District must adjust its budget capacity for the three fiscal years audited. Budget capacity adjustment calculations for the District will be made by ADE's School Finance Unit once the audit is finalized.

Basic State Aid adjustment of \$261,146.35 required to be repaid by the District—Auditors identified an overall funding adjustment of \$261,146.35 for the three fiscal years audited due to improperly reported enrollment data and AOI data errors.

Table 7 lists the ADM adjustments and the associated Basic State Aid adjustments for the District for FY2015, FY2016 and FY2017.
